



SPEAKERS: TUBERCULOSIS, THINKING ABOUT THE DELAY IN DIAGNOSIS

Ana Sofia Sousa: Medical doctor specialized in public health since 2019. Master in medicine by ICBAS - University of Porto (2013), resident doctor in Public Health (2015-2019), she has developed investigation and intervention projects at local level since 2017 mainly in tuberculosis, health economics and occupational health. She is a member of the National Tuberculosis Program team at the Directorate-General of Health since 2019; a PhD student in ICBAS since 2020, studying the impact of TB screening among vulnerable populations, namely stone quarry workers; and she is an invited assistant Professor at the same faculty since 2021.

João Almeida Santos: PhD in Public Health (2022), MSc in Emerging Infectious Diseases (2007), Postgraduate degree in Clinical Microbiology (2003) and a BSc in Clinical Analysis and Public Health (2001). He has developed his activity in the areas of clinical immunology, Public Health, and diagnosis and surveillance of Infectious Diseases. He is also a researcher at the National School of Public Health (ENSP) – NOVA University Lisbon, and a collaborator of the Comprehensive Health Research Center (CHRC). More recently, he has participated in research related to the identification of risk factors for delayed diagnosis of tuberculosis and serosurveillance of COVID-19.

Isabel Carvalho: Pediatrician at the Pediatric Department, Vila Nova de Gaia Hospital Center, Director of the National Tuberculosis Programme, Directorate-General of Health, Portugal. She is also the head of Pediatric Tuberculosis care at the Vila Nova de Gaia Outpatient TB Center, head of Pediatric Pulmonology care at the Pediatric Department, Vila Nova de Gaia Hospital Center, and a Pediatric Tuberculosis consultant in the North Region of Portugal. She is member of the Technical Commission for Vaccination, Directorate-General of Health, for BCG. She authored several national and international publications, reviewed scientific journals and is a member of Scientific Societies.

Joan Cayla: Physician specialized in Family and Community Medicine and in Preventive Medicine and Public Health. Since 1986 senior technician of the Epidemiology Service of the Public Health Agency of Barcelona and from 1994 to 2017 Head of this Service. Coordinator of the Barcelona TB Research Unit (UITB) since 1995. Principal investigator in various national and international projects. Author of more than 200 publications on the epidemiology of infectious diseases. President of the UITB Foundation since 2016 from where every year we organize 3 relevant events: World TB Day, Conference on Emerging Diseases and International TB Conference.



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Ana Isabel Ribeiro: (MPH, PhD) is an epidemiologist and health geographer. She is a Researcher at the Public Health Institute of the University of Porto and an Invited Assistant Professor at the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Porto. Ana is the leader and founder of the Research Lab “Health and Territory”, a research group of the Laboratory for Integrative and Translational Research in Population Health. She is particularly interested in understanding how the social and biogeophysical context where individuals live influence their health and well-being and on emerging health risks such as climate change and environmental degradation.

Dennis Falzon: works at the Global TB Programme of the World Health Organization (WHO) in Geneva, Switzerland. Before joining WHO in 2008 he was a medical epidemiologist at the EuroTB surveillance project in France, and earlier worked in public health in state and non-governmental sectors. Dr Falzon currently leads a team working on TB prevention and innovation. He is involved in guidance on the treatment of TB disease and TB infection and TB prevention; TB/COVID-19; the integration of digital technologies in support of the End TB Strategy; innovations in TB care and guidance; and evidence gathering.

Mario Ravioglione: Full Professor of Global Health at the University of Milan, Italy, where is a founding director at the Centre for Multidisciplinary Research on Health Science (MACH) and coordinates the first Master in Global Health online in Italy. Until 2017, he worked at WHO where, starting in 2003, he was Director of the Global Tuberculosis (TB) Programme. He is one of the 10 most cited authors worldwide in TB, and has over 300 publications on TB, AIDS, infectious diseases, COVID-19 and global health, and an additional 200 publications including book chapters and policy documents.

Raquel Duarte: medical doctor specialized in pulmonology with academic training in Public Health and Health Economics. She is a pulmonologist at the Centro Hospitalar de Vila Nova de Gaia/Espinho, an Invited Assistant Professor at the Institute of Biomedical Sciences Abel Salazar, University of Porto, and head of the lab “Epidemiology of Mycobacteria Infection, HIV and other Sexually Transmitted Infections” at the Laboratory for Integrative and Translational Research in Population Health. She was Secretary of State for Health of the XXI Portuguese Government and Secretary General, Vice President and recently elected President of the “Europe Region Officers International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Diseases. She is the group coordinator that prepared the country’s deconfinement/opening plan to COVID-19.
